Flathead volunteer scorers needed!

WCM is currently in the middle of a quantitative research project which will measure the impact of coaching on students' writing outcomes. With permission, the research team has collected and anonymized student work. Now we need a pool of volunteers to help us score the anonymized work.

Volunteer scorers will be trained by writing assessment expert, Dr. Beverly Chin, University of Montana Professor Emeritus of English and previous Director of English Teaching and Montana Writing Project.

After being trained, participants will read student essays and score each paper according to the holistic rubric provided. The scores will not affect actual student grades.

The volunteer scoring event will take place on **Saturday, March 8th from 8:30am-4pm at Columbia Falls High School.** Volunteers will need to be participate in the entire day's in-person event. Morning refreshments and lunch are

provided.

Educators can receive OPI renewal credits.

This collaboration underscores the power of shared vision and community engagement in advancing educational innovation. While Lucille's project is independent of WCM, we are delighted to encourage this burgeoning scholar's work and share this opportunity with Montana teachers:

Lucille's thesis project, From Fables to Facts: Discovering the World Through Stories and Science, is a dynamic program that integrates compelling narratives drawn from fables and diverse cultural traditions with hands-on science experiments. This unique approach is designed to spark early environmental curiosity, promote meaningful engagement, and encourage lifelong stewardship of the natural world.

By pairing storytelling with interactive scientific activities, the curriculum creates a rich, experiential learning environment that brings abstract environmental concepts to life. The program also leverages strong local partnerships with institutions such as SpectrUM Discovery Area, EmPower Place at the Foodbank, and Bitterroot Early Learning Network, enhancing its impact across the community.
